Taking Hints from the Brits in Planning Your Garden

Mary Lou Nahas and her son, Chris, visited the Royal Horticultural Society's annual Hampton Court Flower Show in the early summer of 2014 along with a visit to Bath and around Wales. They came away from Britain very impressed with how ordinary citizens (not professionals) have produced such beautiful gardens. They will be our guest speakers on Sunday, January 18th, at the East Greenbush Community Library. The title of their talk and slide show is "Taking Hints from the Brits in Planning Your Garden." The program is designed to give us ideas on planning our gardens for spring.

Now is a good time for planning as we begin getting the onslaught of garden catalogues and drooling at the possibilities. Or perhaps you're making plans for a trip to the Philadelphia Flower Show in early March to get some ideas for the spring. Mary Lou and Chris will help us along by showing what individual British gardeners are doing. They will take us down a market street in Wales, to the Hampton Court Flower Show, and to Bath, to give us images we may want to incorporate into our home gardens.

Mary Lou Nahas is a very active (and talented) gardener living in Oak Hill, New York, in Greene County. She is chairperson of the Clematis Garden Club and active in the Federated Garden Club activities in Greene County and beyond. She has been a member of CHIS for many years and is responsible for recommending many of the best speakers we have had at our meetings. She and her husband, Nick, operate the I U Tripp Antiques and Collectibles in Oak Hill. Their son Chris, a graduate of Pratt Institute, is a consulting art director for New York City based companies, and operates Icepedition, a company that takes you on spectacular tours of Iceland, and/or arranges individual tour plans for independent travellers. Chris has inherited his mother's gardening eye and contributes to the beautiful gardens in Oak Hill.

The East Greenbush Community library is located on Community Way off Michaels Road in East Greenbush. From Albany or I-787, take the Patroon Island Bridge to Exit 9 and go south on Route 4 for about a half mile to Route 151 going east, ¾ of the way around the traffic circle. Michaels Road is the second right off Route 151. Bring a dessert or snack to share, bring a friend or two, and prepare to enjoy yourself. Coffee and goodies start at 1:30 and the meeting will begin at 2:00.

Neglected Business from November

There were several important business decisions made at the November meeting that I neglected to put into the December newsletter. One is that it was voted to donate \$200 to Region 2 for 2014. Another vote was to spend \$500 on gift certificates -- \$450 for the Holiday Party door prizes in December, and another \$50 for two gift certificates for the Doldrums Party in February. The gift certificates will focus on iris growers so that winners can order and grow plants that can later be divided to for contributions to the plant sales in spring and fall. It was also decided that CHIS will continue its presence at the annual Capital District Garden and Flower Show at Hudson Valley Community College in late March.
