### Rethinking Wild Edibles at the Doldrums Party, February 21<sup>st</sup>

Sunday, February 21st is the date for the annual Doldrums Party at the Albany County Cooperative Extension – a joint effort among three Capital Region gardening clubs, the Capital Hudson Iris Society, the Hudson Adirondack Daylily Society, and the Upstate New York Hosta Society. This year we are the hosts of the party, so we have some extra things to think about.

We've arranged for a very special guest speaker this year. Rob Handel has been cooking since his grandmother first set him to cracking eggs and peeling potatoes in her resort kitchen as a child. Since then he has broadened his culinary horizons through research and travel, as well as periods of formal study in biology, chemistry, and culinary arts. Rob is currently the executive chef at The Bees Knees Café at Heather Ridge Farm, where he crafts both classic dishes and unique preparations pairing the meat and poultry raised on the farm with local produce, cheeses, dairy, and foraged goods. While not in the kitchen, Rob can be found in the woods foraging mushrooms and wild foods, or tending to his own small home farm.

The title of his talk is "Rethinking Wild Edibles". Many gardeners are familiar with the edible wild plants that threaten to overtake their neat beds. Despite this, getting these from the garden to the table seems like no mean task. Foraging books are redolent with the same old recipes for sauteed greens and sparse salads that fail to excite and make the diner want more. In this presentation, Rob discusses some unique uses that he has developed for using wild edibles in sodas, condiments, sauces, and more. The presentation will include samples of some of the preparations discussed, as well as recipes for you to try in your home kitchen. Rob's hope is that you never look at a patch of burdock or garlic mustard the same again!

You should arrive between 11-11:30 a.m. and bring with you a dish to share and a contribution for the door prizes if you can. Your dish can be a casserole, a main dish, side dish, dessert, salad, anything that you make that is particularly delicious and you want to share with others. If you would like to help with the set-up, arrive earlier (10:00) – your assistance will be highly appreciated. We hope to have many door prizes, including gift certificates to growers and garden centers and other garden-related items. If you have something you know would be appreciated for the door-prize table, please bring it and add it to the table.

#### Hidden Gardens of Paris

CHIS members Joanne and Dan Maier were our tour guides on January 17 as they took us on a virtual visit to two of their favorite gardens in Paris. Neither garden is well represented in the guidebooks and, maybe as a result, neither is overcrowded as so many of the museums and attractions in Paris are.

The Albert Kahn garden was established in the final years of the nineteenth century by a wealthy financier who melded a variety of styles from all corners of the earth and dedicated his garden to world peace. Having toured this garden in both spring and winter, Dan and Joanne were impressed with both the detailed hardscape and the wealth of plant material to be seen.

The second garden, located at the headquarters of UNESCO (near the Eiffel Tower), is anchored by a uniquely modern Japanese garden complete with a bamboo grove, water features, monolithic sculptures and terraced seating areas. This installation, designed by renowned sculptor Isamu Noguchi, is also dedicated to world peace.

If you're planning a visit to Paris in the near future, check with Joanne and Dan for details on finding and enjoying these hidden gems in the City of Light. – D. Maier

#### "Going East in 2016", the AIS Convention in May

This May we have a unique opportunity to attend the annual national convention of the American Iris Society

relatively close by in Newark, New Jersey. Most of the AIS conventions have been in Washington, Oregon and areas where a majority of the hybridizers live. So we're excited that we can attend a convention within an easy drive, 2.5 hours.

The full convention runs from Monday, May 23 – Saturday, May 28, but most of us will be going on Wednesday morning, May 25 and returning Sunday morning, May 29. Besides dinners and receptions, the convention includes garden tours Thursday – Saturday of Presby Memorial Iris Garden in Upper Montclair, NJ, The Hildenbrandt Garden near Slatington, PA, and Glenora Gardens in Palmerton, PA. Wednesday includes programs from the affiliated societies such as the Median Iris Society, Reblooming Iris Society, Spuria, HIPS, Japanese, and Louisiana Iris Societies. On Thursday, after the tours, there are programs from the Aril, Siberian and Tall Bearded Iris Societies. For those who are interested, a "Land of the Free" tour leaves early morning on Tuesday, May 24, going to Philadelphia for the US Independence National Historic Park, Liberty Bell, and the Morris Arboretum of the University of Pennsylvania. The host hotel is the Newark Liberty International Airport Marriott Hotel. Separate reservations can be made with the hotel by Monday. May 2, by calling 973-634-0006 and asking for the American Iris Society event rate of \$114 per night.
