Melanie Mason on Daylilies at January meeting

CHIS ushered in the new year with a lively and informative program on daylilies presented by local hybridizer Melanie Mason. Melanie owns North Country Daylilies in Buskirk, northeast of Troy in the rolling foothills of the Green Mountains. Her program focused on the progression of daylily hybridization from the 1950's onward.

Starting with what was then available (basically low-growing orange and yellow single- petalled varieties), hybridizers tweaked the genus every which way to produce something exciting and different, often with stunning results. Through the process of tetraploidy, blossoms became bigger, wider, sturdier and often double on taller, more vigorous scapes. New colors emerged including creams, violets, deep purple-blacks and reds with eye-catching green and yellow throats. Ruffling and diverse patterning came into vogue.

Now, the pendulum seems to be swinging back the other way to showcase longer narrower petals (spider varieties) complete with horns, teeth, curls and fangs!

We're looking forward to a ride out to Melanie's Long Lesson Farm in late spring to capture a few of these fanged beauties for our own garden!
