Fall Bus Trip Sunday, 9/17 to NY Botanical Garden

CHIS will open our new "season" with a trip to the New York Botanical Garden in the Bronx with it's special Dale Chihuly glass sculpture exhibit located throughout the gardens. **The bus sign-up is full with a waiting list**. If you signed up and received acknowledgement from Linda that you are on the list, you should also have just received a note from Euthemia requesting an RSVP so that anyone with last minute changes can release their seat for the people on the waiting list.

The **Wade Tours bus** will leave from the **Crossgates Mall Macy's Overflow Lot, Upper Level, West End of the mall** at 8:00 a.m. on Sunday, September 17th. Please get there by 7:45. We will return to the same spot at about 7:00 p.m. **Bring a check for \$50 for each person made out to CHIS** – we do not take credit cards and don't want to be walking around with too much cash!

It is highly recommended that you bring a bag lunch, snacks and water with you. There are places to buy lunch at NYBG but they tend to be quite expensive and crowded. Go online to www.NYBG.org for restaurant options.

If you signed up but know you won't be able to go, please contact Euthemia Matsoukas immediately so that she can contact people on the waiting list. Her email address is <u>euthemia@nycap.rr.com</u>. It is important that we have a full bus since we are charging people less than cost (the \$50 charged for each person includes the round trip bus fare, NYBG All-Garden Pass, and a bagel and juice breakfast on the bus.) The bus trip is partially supported by money earned at our Siberian Iris and Perennial Sale and the Iris Rhizome Sale.

The Dale Chihuly Glass Sculpture Exhibit was specifically designed for the NYBG and includes drawings and early works that reveal the evolution and development of Chihuly's artistic process during his celebrated career. The All-Garden Pass includes admission to the Enid Haupt Conservatory, tram ride around the gardens, current garden exhibitions, the Rock Garden and Native Plant Garden, and the Art Gallery and Britton Science Rotunda and Gallery.

Digging & Dividing Irises

Right in time for rhizome dividing and replanting your large or overgrown clumps of bearded irises, the Maine Iris Society has posted a presentation prepared by the Bluegrass Iris Society on digging and dividing irises. It also covers information about the iris borer and the use of bleach in the cleaning of dug iris rhizomes. This video is very educational and is good for veteran and novice iris growers alike.
