# Uh-oh... What's going on with my irises?

If you've ever experienced leaf spot, borer damage, or bacterial rot in your iris beds, you know how upsetting that can be. What to do, what to do?

Chuck Chapman, hybridizer of northern-hardy irises, has dealt with these issues at his gardens just northeast of Guelph, Ontario, in Canada.

In some instances, Chuck uses commercial products, but he also advocates early intervention, by hand, for the borer, and judicious trimming for foliar infections.



Chuck says you can detect borer presence early in the spring by examining the foliage for those serrated edges where the tiny borer has entered the leaf. You then follow its path downward and squeeze it right in the foliage when you find it.

The more mature borer finds it way down to the rhizome where it grows big and fat.



We might encounter these beasts when we divide our iris plants in midsummer. A 15minute soak in a ten percent chlorine bleach solution will sanitize the rhizomes and kill any borers they harbor.



Leaf spot is another malady we sometimes see in our iris gardens. It's a fungal infection that requires scrupulous fall cleanup. Chuck reminds us not to compost infected leaves.
