# RVP Message

## Greetings, Iris Lovers



Just as my irises were showing themselves for the 2022 season, I was off to Las Cruses, New Mexico for the AIS National Convention in April. Even in New Mexico it was too early for all but the earliest bearded iris. There were great opportunities to see Arils and Arilbreds that love dry heat and sandy soil. They were spectacular. The members of Mesilla Valley Iris Society had a well-organized and interesting variety of activities and programs. It was also a great social event, meeting hybridizers from across the country and growers with expertise in every class and size.

My garden wasn't the best this year. There was the

weather, time away when the garden needed attention, and the fact that my age has caught up with me too quickly. Health issues are making it impossible for me to function affectively. Thanks to the help of good friends and neighbors I was able to keep going through another season. I can only hope for another year with the ability to work in my garden. Not being able to tend my irises would break my heart. I will treasure my years of contribution to AIS and GRIS (Greater Rochester Iris Society). But it is clear that the time has come for me to step away from the position of RVP to focus on my health, my family and what gardening I can do at home.

I leave you with a few random ideas.

"Is the American Iris Society more about irises or the society?" This is a question we all should ponder. I have thought that learning about new cultivars was our mission. But this is only part of it. It is also part social. Communicating as a group with common interests is a challenge. The COVID years made it more so. Is there anything that we can do to improve this? I know that we have people with the energy and creativity it will take to move forward.

I don't grow irises just to look at them. Sharing my irises in bloom is the highlight of my social year. It's a time when friends from various milestones in my life come together. For example, I was invited to a third-grade student's bar mitzvah. Years later that same student, and family, came to see my irises. Friends from my life at church and social justice organizations have come to my garden along with friends from high school. Some of these people I may see only once a year, but it is my garden that brings us together.

I would encourage more people to share their gardens with other AIS members or other gardeners, in person or virtually. There are many ways in which to do this. If you are technology averse, there are probably family members and friends who would be glad to help. I would be glad to help as I'm able. One example: if you have Facebook and a smart phone, you can live stream your garden.

#### Show your joy! Welcome new attendees:

I have been asked why people show up for a presentation and never return. This is not a phenomenon unique to the AIS. I have often attended a meeting and left feeling not welcomed, not included. After one meeting I called up an attendee and asked, "Why didn't you return? You have some great ideas to contribute." Her response was, "I was told, 'Maybe you should wait a bit before you contribute. The people here have much more experience. You should wait until you've been to a few meetings.'" Often, we think we are welcoming, but it may be perceived in a different way. It turns out she did have experience to share with the group, but, sadly, she never returned.

Your input is always important. Would it be helpful to develop a survey, especially for new members? It might include questions on areas of interest, ideas for programs, a "what might you share?" question, comfort level with various social media options, and an open-ended request for "other ideas". Should we expand our programs beyond irises? What programs might we develop with other horticultural groups, schools, and educational organizations?

In closing, I would like to thank you all for your contributions and I wish you great joy in every season!

With the pandemic, this event has become a virtual one where interested participants connect with seed companies and plant groups via the internet. Taking into consideration this year's AIS membership drive, ONIS advertised the free 1-year AIS membership if interested individuals joined ONIS. This resulted in four new members. (Welcome!)

Despite being rained out for one of the weekends and a lack of bloom on another (happens every year between SDB and IB/MTB bloom), about a dozen people dropped by to stroll the garden. It was a wonderful feeling being able to welcome back visitors.

In mid-July ONIS held an online rhizome sale. Over 100 iris cultivars of various classes of bearded irises were made available. Members and Facebook friends

across Canada eagerly to took advantage of this offer. Originally this was to be a 10-day sale however when post-sale inquiries kept trickling in, the sale was extended until mid-August. All proceeds will go towards future ONIS events.

# Western New York Iris Society (WNYIS)

WNYIS has been a busy organization during 2021-2022. Since the last newsletter, we have grown in many ways. We changed our meeting format: business first and then teaching and fun. We gave presentations on various classes of iris; providing handouts at every meeting on the presentation subject matter, including "What do you do in your iris garden this month? We developed a WNYIS brochure which includes a calendar of meeting dates, presentations, and location of our meetings.

The AIS membership drive in the spring worked positively with our local push to recruit new members. We recruited twelve new members, more than doubling our numbers! Other recruitment strategies included handing out brochures, placing ads in newspapers, and having talks on irises and our local society given by our president. During the summer, there were Open Gardens which gave visitors the opportunity to view Ensata and Louisiana irises in bloom. Unfortunately the one planned for Spuria irises had to be cancelled when there was no bloom. Prior to the iris and perennial show, we had demonstrations on design and how to enter an iris and perennial show.

At the June 4<sup>th</sup> Iris and Perennial Show, judges included Wendy Roller and Donna Lowry from GRIS and two National Garden Club judges. Additional judges came from WNYIS. The winning irises were from many different classes while the winning perennial was an Allium. David Baehre won the Best in Show with 'Kiss the Girl', a Siberian iris; the first runner-up with 'Bashful Love', a tall bearded iris; and the second runner-up with 'Sea Krill', a species-cross iris. He also won the Silver medal with 21 first place ribbons. Wendy Roller won the Bronze medal with10 first place ribbons and the Region 2 Magdalen Award with 'Brown Berry', a border bearded iris. Chris Krzal won the Best Design Award. Michael Roller won the Best Seedling Award. It was a fun show, and we recruited two new members! (*More details on page 14 - ed.*)

# Median Iris Judges' Training Event May 25, 2022

My husband and I live in the Town of Greece, a suburb of Rochester. Our house sits on an average-sized lot with three mature trees in the front yard - a red maple, a pin oak, and a pink dogwood. In the backyard is a very old crab-apple tree, a shed, a vegetable garden, and some raspberry bushes. I grow spring and summer bulbs (including *I. reticulata* and Dutch Iris), various perennials and wildflowers, and over 190 varieties of irises and beardless iris seedlings. The garden areas are located along one fence line, beside three foundation walls, and in two modest gardens in the midst of the lawn. All garden areas are maintained with concrete block or black plastic landscape edging.

Four Region 2 judges traveled a fair distance to obtain two hours of in-garden Judges' Training in my yard on a cool spring day. Since everyone present was an AIS master judge, the training event concentrated on "discussing the changes in or new additions to the ingarden median iris sections of the recently updated AIS Judges' handbook." Training Some of the changes/additions to the handbook have been made to address the different species of irises being used today hybridizing the various median iris classes. in Advancements continue to be made in the types of stalks, the number of branches and the total bud count available in each of these classes. More precise formulas have also evolved for judges to use when comparing stalk height and blossom size proportions. These formulas will be especially useful when evaluating the rigidly defined miniature tall bearded iris and border bearded iris classes.

After finishing our discussions, we walked the gardens to observe iris clumps that exhibited the various characteristics we had discussed in the handbook. One standard dwarf iris was still in bloom, the intermediate and miniature tall bearded irises were in full bloom, and several of the border bearded irises were in bloom or exhibited fully developed stalks with buds showing color. With 6-inch rulers and yard sticks in hand, we observed iris clumps, counted plant increases, compared stalk heights with the height and width of individual iris flowers, and counted the numbers of potential buds. In all, there were about 38 varieties of irises in bloom that day.

## THE YEAR IN REVIEW

During the period August 1, 2021 – July 31, 2022, Region 2 accredited judges and student judges collectively earned 16 hours of credit for attending or presenting in-garden training sessions held within the region. Region 2 accredited judges and student judges also collectively earned 24 credit hours for attending AIS classroom sessions via zoom which aired from the states of California, Nebraska, and Texas.

A summary of the Judges' Training sessions offered within Region 2 during the last year is as follows:

- In May, AIS Master Judge Kate Brewitt presented a one-hour in-garden Judges' Training session on standard dwarf bearded irises and a one-hour in-garden Judges' Training session on intermediate bearded irises at Aurora Borealis Iris Garden, located in Aurora, Ontario, Canada.
- In May, AIS Master Judge Wendy Roller presented a two-hour in-garden Judges' Training session on median irises in her home garden in Rochester, New York.

## **UPCOMING 2022 IN-GARDEN JUDGES' TRAINING SCHEDULED IN REGION 2**

Start the 2022/2023 Judges' Training period with an in-garden session on Reblooming Irises. On Sunday, September 11<sup>th</sup> from 1:00 pm until 3:00 pm Chuck Chapman, AIS Master Judge, will give two hours of in-garden Judges' Training on '*Reblooming Iris*' at Chapman Iris Farm. The farm is located at 8790 Wellington Road 124, Guelph, Ontario, Canada N1H 6H7. To find the location on Google Maps, etc., use *Erin, Ontario* as the search location.

In addition to this being a good opportunity to receive in-garden Judges' Training, Chuck states the program is good for anyone interested in extended bloom in their gardens. This means you don't have to be a judge to take advantage of this session...and as a non-judge, there's no test, although you are welcome to take it should you want to see if you remember what you learned.

During the session the following topics will be discussed:

- (1) the quality of rebloomers currently available on the market
- (2) plant maturity and bud set
- (3) different types of rebloomers
- (4) how to determine maturity and how to determine when bud set occurs
- (5) iris culture necessary for good rebloom

Chuck assures us there will be some irises in bloom, however, he will not be able to give a better estimate until closer to the day. As of the middle of July, there were nine cultivars in bloom with more on the way. Current weather conditions suggest good fall bloom. The garden is in agricultural zone 4 (a cold pocket in the middle of agricultural zone 5 in surrounding areas).

A selection of reliable agricultural zone 4 reblooming iris will be potted up for sale at this session. Contact Chuck at <u>chuck@chapmaniris.com</u> for a listing of the available cultivars.

- A. If you live in Canada, contact Chuck ahead of time to let him know of your intended order. That way enough potted plants can be made available.
- B. If you live in the United States, plant orders will need to be handled differently. To cross the Canada/United States border with plant materials: (1) a phytosanitary certificate is required and (2) all irises must be "bareroot." The cost for the certificate is \$15.00 per car. Chuck will need a minimum of ten days advance notice to arrange for the certificate and to prepare the irises to meet United States "bareroot" border crossing requirements.
