
Additional AIS awards include AIS Silver Medal awarded to Joanne Bassett and AIS Bronze Medal awarded to Joseph Babulski.

Congratulations to Howie Dash on receiving the 2023 Wister Medal for his iris tall-bearded iris 'Chihuahuan Desert'. Each year three Wister Medals are awarded, as voted by AIS registered

judges.

Long time members of AIS Region 2 will remember Howie as a member of the Hudson Valley Iris and Daylily Society (HVIDS). During his time with them he served as vice-president and president. In 2009 he and his wife, Lilly, moved to Las Cruses, New Mexico, when he embarked on his hybridizing journey. 'Chihuahuan Desert' was one of Howie's first introductions, along with 'Organ Mountain Sunrise'.

Howie's irises have received other awards as well. At the 2017 AIS National Convention in Des Moines, lowa, he won the Lloyd Zubrigg-Clarence Mahan Seedling Cup for his seedling ADG 11-02-04. This seedling was eventually named 'Flamingo Fever'.

In 2015, Howie started hybridizing arilbred irises. His first introduction, 'Chihuahua Night', won the President's Cup at the 2022 AIS National Convention in Las Cruces, New Mexico.

When I emailed Howie to get information on him and his introductions, he ended his email by saying he feels lucky that his irises have been well received, and that he is fortunate that several have been awarded with Honorable Mentions and/or Award of Merits.


In April, UNYHS, CHIS and HADS held their first combined meeting. Kathryn Mohr presented a program titled "Try Growing a New Type of Iris".





Different types of plant stakes were shown, along with information on how to order some of them, with a discount going to AIS members (for details check the shopping section of IRISES for the Kincaid Plant Markers ad – ed). We also provided information on the resources available to identify an unidentified iris with the AIS WIKI being the number one choice! (WebHome < Main < Iris Wiki (irises.org) – ed.)

On a cool morning in May members, friends and family of GRIS went to Iris Country Gardens, the former home of Dana and Sylvia Borglum, iris hybridizers from New York State. Now owned by sisters Reba and Sara Martin, it is always a great destination for iris lovers.

It had been two years since some of us had been to the gardens, and there were changes aplenty! They are slowly renovating each area, bringing more and different varieties of iris and other perennials for our perusal and enjoyment. Fortunately, they still have the 'dig-your-own' iris bed, and we had a great time picking out good size rhizomes and digging them up (shovels are provided)!

We had hoped to have a picnic lunch, but the weather had other ideas, with the forecasted late afternoon rain coming early. So, we ate in our cars and headed home...although the rain and cold did not deter us from stopping for ice cream on our way home!

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

August 1, 2022 to July 31, 2023

- In September 2022, AIS Master Judge Chuck Chapman presented a two-hour in-garden judges training session on Reblooming Irises at his farm property in Guelph, Ontario, Canada.
- In June 2023, AIS Master Judge Joanne Bassett presented a two-hour in-garden judges training session on Siberian Irises in her home garden in Marilla, New York.


• When three members of the Western New York Iris Society were interested in being certified as artistic design judges as part of the new AIS Design Judge Artistic Accreditation Program, AIS Garden/Exhibition Judge Marilee Farry designed and taught a course to fulfill the requirements. Once a month from November, 2022 to March, 2023, the class met at the Julia B. Reinstein Library in Cheektowaga, NY to study the principles of artistic design, to discuss how to judge artistic designs entered at iris shows (based on requirements of the AIS), to take and successfully pass a 30-question test on the principals and elements of design, and to

critique the design every participant made as an assignment for each class session. Each of the participants spent a minimum of

15 hours to fulfill the course requirements.
