Treasurer's Report

As of August 1, 2024, Region 2 of the American Society Iris Society has \$7,604.28 in its checking account and a \$1,000 I-bond valued at \$1,093.17 which includes accumulated interest. Total assets as of July 31, 2024, are \$8,697.45.

Total revenue received since January 1, 2024, was \$200.57. This was made up of an affiliate contribution of \$100.00, revenue from the Spring Gathering silent auction of \$45.00, a reversal of \$10 in bank charges and I-bond interest of \$45.47.

Total expenses since January 1, 2024, were \$787.06. These included \$123.65 for the website hosting and domain fees, \$149.90 for 2023's Zoom account license, \$159.90 for 2024's Zoom account license, \$350.00 for the RVP registration fee to the 2024 AIS national convention, and \$3.61 in international bank fees related to the HostPapa account.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

During the period August 1, 2023 – July 31, 2024, the Region 2 accredited judges and one candidate for judgeship collectively earned 15 hours of credit for attending or presenting in-garden and classroom judges' training sessions held within the region. The individuals also collectively earned 13 credit hours for attending AIS Zoom meeting classroom sessions which aired from the states of California and Texas.

Two judges training sessions were offered within Region 2 during the "Spring Regional Gathering in the Garden" event that was held on May 25th in David Baehre's beautiful garden located in Lancaster, New York.

- 1. AIS Master Judge Wendy Roller presented a 2-hour in-garden judges' training session on median irises.
- 2. AIS Master Judge Donna Lowry presented a 1-hour classroom judges' training session on "How to construct a floral artistic design for entry in an iris show."



Looking for Volunteers

Volunteers are fundamental to the success of our region. They are what makes the region 'tick'. During the last few years, the board of Region 2 of the American Iris Society has lost many key players. These positions need to be filled if the region is to continue.

Archivist – Region 2 has an archive made up of newsletters, catalogues, slides, videos, and various other items. You would be responsible for organizing the archive as well as coordinating its storage. This would include determining which items are to be kept, discarded or released to the AIS Library for future management. It may also involve scanning items so they can be uploaded to the AIS Iris Encyclopedia (WIKI).

Awards and Exhibitions Chairperson – This individual shall oversee the rotation of the regional show awards plus arrange for the engraving of award trophies and/or the printing of award certificates for presentation at the fall annual general meeting. The chair also provides basic guidelines to any affiliate that is staging a show for the first time. Being an AIS Judge is helpful but not required.

Newsletter Editor – The editor is currently responsible for compiling and publishing twice yearly a 20 – 30-page newsletter and emailing it to our members. If you took this position you could continue to publish a newsletter or if you had ideas for connecting with Region 2 members in a different manner, the board would be willing to consider them!

Support and training for all positions will be provided by the Board of Directors.

Some Fun Irises to Grow

The 'Sans Souci' Family

The MTB iris 'Sans Souci' is a bit odd. It is a wonderful plant, easily grown and floriferous. However, the appearance of its red falls varies greatly with temperature and the amount of sun it receives. The falls can even appear to be velvety red.

There are several sports* of 'Sans Souci' with erratic expression of their red or yellow pigment. After a hard frost (28°F or -2°C) 'Kaleidoscope' and 'Joseph's Coat Katkamier' may have blossoms that are identical to 'Sans Souci'. On the next page are some of the sports* mentioned.

1. Call to order

Meeting called to order at 7:02 pm with Cara Hutchings, RVP, presiding.

2. Attendance

3. Additions/Corrections to the minutes of the August 9, 2023, and September 13, 2023, Board meetings.

Cara Hutchings, RVP, declared the August minutes approved as circulated and the September minutes approved as corrected.

4. Officer Reports

<u>RVP Report</u> – Cara Hutchings agrees to remain RVP for 2024 and anticipates attending the 2024 AIS National Convention.

<u>Treasurer</u> – Ben Morris presented in Annette Kuhn's absence.

As of September 30, 2023 there was \$8,186.63 in unencumbered funds in the checking account and \$1,022.80 in a US Treasury I-bond. Total assets equal \$9,209.43, compared with a total of \$9,337.59 at the end of 2022.

Finance Committee - Audit of region's financial records will be done for the annual meeting.

Secretary Report - Motions since 2022 general meeting

At the November 30, 2022 meeting the board carried a motion to amend the wording of each Region 2 award to include: "any recipient may opt to receive a certificate in lieu of the award".

At the January 11, 2023 meeting the board carried a motion to invest \$1,000.00 of Region 2 funds in an I-bond: to be reviewed in one year to consider continuation.

At the April 19, 2023 meeting the board carried a motion to send a \$100 donation to the 2023 AIS National Convention organizing host, Iris Society of Dallas.

Clarification on who should submit committee reports at the general meeting was requested. It

was confirmed that the minutes of September 13, 2023 stated only affiliate presidents were exempt from providing a report at the general meeting if there had been no changes since the fall newsletter. It was requested that board and committee reporting obligations be clearly outlined in a document for future reference.

5. Committee Reports

<u>Archives</u> – Ben Morris presented in Dorothy Stiefel's absence. The archive is now located in Ben's residence. The contents of each box have been cataloged.

<u>Awards & Exhibitions</u> – Cara Hutchings (Acting Committee Chair)

The issue of when (and how) to present the physical awards at a Zoom meeting was raised. It was decided awards would be presented at the general meeting. It was also clarified that the motion regarding the issuance of certificates in lieu of awards applied to Region 2 awards only, not to AIS medals. Kathryn agreed to change the wording in all Region 2 award descriptions to include the option of selecting a certificate in lieu of an award; Kathryn will do this prior to stepping down from this position.

An inquiry about the continued funding of the Wirz-Rettig Japanese Iris award was made. It was decided to table this item until the November board meeting.

Judges' Training – Wendy Roller, Committee Chair

Wendy confirmed there would be no changes to the judging status of any Region 2 judge, and all would be approved for 2024.

It was confirmed that the following judges will be considered for certification as Artistic Design Judges as of 2024, David Baehre, Joanne Bassett, Marilee Farry, Maria Gerbracht, and Donna Lowry. Annette Kuhn will be eligible for certification once she finishes her Apprentice Judge requirements.

Membership – Cara Hutchings. Acting Committee Chair

As of October 1, Region 2 has 86 members, a decrease of 38 members (49 non-renewals and 11 new members) since the 2022 general meeting. Thirty-six people took advantage of the 2022 membership drive with six renewing.

Newsletter - Kate Brewitt, Editor

Two newsletters were published in 2023. Each edition is archived in the Ben R. Hager-Sidney DuBose Memorial Iris Library, part of the AIS Iris Encyclopedia (WIKI). Kate has also uploaded to the WIKI all affiliate newsletters she has in her possession.

<u>Technology Consultant</u> – Cara Hutchings presented in Neil Houghton's absence.

Neil is stepping down as committee chair however will remain available for consultation.

Webmaster – Kate Brewitt

Hosting fees for 2023 will total \$190.19. Monthly site visits averaged 1936 unique visits per month. CHIS affiliate page returned as the top viewed page with the newsletter page coming in second. June, July, and August were the most active months.
