<u>Tip of the times:</u> As spring starts to warm up, your iris need to have all those dead leaves and fans cleaned up around them if you didn't do so already. As Wendy has reminded us, maple leaves are very impermeable, so get those out of your garden in fall if possible, and the oak leaves you can leave until spring. This will help keep borer insects at bay, since they like to hibernate in the debris around your iris.
