# July in the Iris patch:

Continue to weed and water your irises and check for iris borers. If borers have eaten into the rhizome, dig it up then remove and destroy the borer. Use a potato peeler to scrape rotten/soft tissue from the rhizome and soak for an hour in a 10% bleach/ water bath. Let the rhizome dry in a cool dry place for a couple days, then replant. If you grow reblooming iris, fertilize them again and keep them well watered.



# Lost and Found Notes from June

Every spring old iris friends surprise me. In 2023 IB 'Sonoran Sands' (Rick Tasco 1995) bloomed for the first time since 2015. SDB 'Grape Orbit' (Anthony and Dorothy Willott 1984) was moved several years ago; it's finally back. 'Demi Deuil' (Denis 1912), and 'Pink Tiger' (El Dorado Iris Gardens 1965) reappeared after being moved several years ago. Sadly, pinkish TB beauty 'Dogrose' (Violet Insole 1930) hasn't bloomed for five years.



On the other hand, I can't seem to get rid of 'Cherie' (David Hall 1945), Dykes Medal 1951. It's a special iris, one of the early "Flamingo Pinks", which were sensational for their time. Its fragrance is strong and sweet. Each year, every rhizome is dug and given away or sold. Each year it reappears. There'll be at least three rhizomes coming to the sale this year. Mother Nature has a cruel sense of humor.

# UNYHS Leadership Message


Dear fellow Hosta lovers,

# **Looking for Daylily PLANT Donations!!**

Our annual daylily sale is August 16 at Faddegons. This is the main fundraiser for HADS and we need your help to make it a huge success. Please check your gardens now for clumps large enough to donate, estimate how many fans from each clump could be donated and send in your list of varieties/fans.

# What do you mean by fan?

A fan is a single plant with its "fan" of leaves. A clump is a group of many fans and in most cases a single fan can become a clump over a few years. For the sale, we will clean a clump and split it into individual fans (one fan attached to its tubers), then include 2 or more in a bag for the sale, depending on size/condition/quantity. We just need your best guess. We understand that counting while they are still in the ground is difficult. Just make your best guess so we can try to be prepared.

# Do I have to donate the whole clump?

NOPE! Feel free save some fans for yourself (and don't include those in your fan estimates.) It is YOUR garden. This is a great way to tidy up/spread out those large clumps to keep your garden in healthy shape. If you'd like to donate an entire clump to make room for another variety you might like even more, we will happily take the whole clump!

# What do you mean by variety?

The variety is the identifying name of the plant type. What was it called when you bought it? South Seas? Mary Todd? In the Heart of it All? These names help us look up the details in the AHS database for the tags and to make sure we have the pictures for the sale tables. If we cannot locate a picture, we might ask you if you have one from your garden.

# What if I don't know the variety name?

We prefer it if you know the variety, However, unknown variety plants can be used for gift plants at the sale, or if you have a good picture (and maybe tell us the approximate date it bloomed), we can sell it as an unknown.

# Do I have to dig them now?

No. Wait for the week before the sale. If you can dig out the clump (try putting it in a trash bag and labeling the bag) and bring it to the cleaning/labeling party, we can separate them as a group and get them labeled. You can also separate them yourself and bring them to the cleaning/labeling party to get them labeled. If you need help digging, let us know ahead of time and we will work to try to arrange something. We know not everyone is able to dig but please speak up sooner rather than later. Talk to someone in the group for details and other options.



# Why do you need this data now?

We would like some time to gather all the details for each plant, make sure we have the pictures (or try to get one if we don't), and to print the labels ahead of time to make things easier on the labeling day.

# How do I submit my Varieties/Fan Counts?

We have two different options for you.

**OPTION 1:** Fill out a Google form online. We have tried to make it easy enough that you can fill out one line for each Variety and the corresponding fan estimates, separating the variety from the fan estimate with a Colon (:).

## For Example,

South Seas: 10 In the Heart of it All: 7

This method will store all the data in a Google Sheet for us. https://forms.gle/L8CwoXAs75kVgGVW9

**OPTION 2:** If you decide to email your data instead, make sure you include your name, phone number (in case of questions only), and a list of each variety and corresponding fan estimate, separated by a colon.

# American Hosta Growers Association 2025 Hosta of the Year

With the increasing number of hosta cultivars being introduced each year it is increasingly difficult for nursery owners and gardeners to choose just the right hostas for their sales areas and gardens. To this end the American Hosta Growers Association established the AHGA Hosta of the Year in 1996. It is selected by a vote of AHGA members. Award winners are hostas that are good garden plants in all regions of the country, are widely available in sufficient supply, and retail for about \$15.00 in the year of selection.


