# **President's Pointers**

Like you, I can't wait to get out in the garden. And like every year, there is the usual list of Spring chores to be done to prepare your irises for the season.

- Check rhizomes for soft rot. If found, cut back rhizome to where it is white and firm. Do this on a sunny day to allow cuts to callous over.
- Replant heaving irises by either pushing them in the ground or, if still frozen, cover roots with some soil.
- 3. Clean up garden debris and damaged foliage from around iris rhizomes.
- 4. Fertilize with 10-10-10 once new growth appears.

#### Will We Have 'Normal' Spring?

One of our Facebook friends asked if weather effected how irises performed because she found that her irises performed well one year, but not the next. In 2019 her irises were upright and grew well however the following year, many did not bloom, while those that did bloom flopped over.

These are just some of the problems experienced by most of us in southern Ontario. The last two Springs have been unkind to irises. Both years saw above normal temperatures in March causing the irises to start their growth cycle. This was followed by below normal temperatures in April. As a result some of the developing bloom stalks were damaged. As the season progressed these bloom stalks appeared S-shaped or wavy. Buds formed on the stalks but rather than emerging as a flower, they turned to mush. Another problem we experienced was short stalks. Many of the stalks on the median irises did not reach the cultivars usual height.

The following picture of the SDB 'Radiate' (Johnson, 2019) taken last year shows the stunted growth in the stalk. This iris usually measures about 12" but as you can see from the picture, the bottom branch is only an inch or so above the base of the plant. The full height was only about 8" tall.



With any luck we will have a more normal spring this year. March's temperatures were more in line with a typical year. Hopefully April will provide us with further seasonal weather patterns!

#### **Open Garden**

After a two-year absence we're opening our garden to visitors. The garden will be open every Saturday and Sunday between May 21st and June 12th by appointment only. Masks are not required but visitors are encouraged to wear one. Potted irises will be available for sale. Hope to see you in the garden!

# 3rd Annual Virtual Flower Show

## **April 1 to July 15, 2022**

We are back with the third annual virtual iris show! This year we have made some changes hoping to make it a bit more interesting. We took a 'page' from the British Iris Society's virtual show so please read the show schedule carefully to ensure your entries comply with the new requirements.

Summary of changes,

- 1. Only 8 classes.
- 2. Only 2 pictures required in 5 of the classes.
- 3. Addition of other Iridaceae such as crocus.
- 4. 'Display Only' class share pictures of your irises...just for fun.
- Members' Choice voting Pictures will be posted on the ONIS website, <u>Ontario Iris Society</u> (google.com).

## **The Show Schedule**

Classes are as follows.

Class 1. Any bearded iris except Tall Bearded.

Class 2. Any Tall Bearded iris.

Class 3. Any type of Beardless iris.

Class 4. Any seedling iris that you have bred yourself (Bearded or Beardless).

Class 5. Any Historic iris (Bearded or Beardless) introduced 1992 or earlier.

Class 6. Any Species or Species Cross iris (e.g. Junos, Reticulatas) or other Iridaceae (e.g. Gladiolus, Crocus etc.).

Class 7. Any iris or irises in a landscape setting.

Class 8. Display Only – Got a picture you'd like to share? We welcome other iris related photos. These will not be judged and are ineligible for prizes.

#### **How To Enter**

Number of entries is limited to 3 entries per class provided each entry is of a different cultivar.

For classes 1 - 5 please send 2 photos per entry, one of the whole bloom stalk and another of a close up of a bloom on the stalk. This way the judges can

do a similar job to that done at one of our in-person iris shows.

Only named irises registered with the AIS can be entered for classes 1, 2, 3, and 5. If you are not sure of the name of your iris go to the AIS Iris Encyclopedia at <a href="WebHome < Main < Iris Wiki (irises.org">WebHome < Main < Iris Wiki (irises.org)</a> and do a search. Seedlings (class 4) should be given seedling designation e.g. 19abxn2.

Images should be nearly square and of a reasonable size. Please reduce large images (no more than 2 MB). The optimum size would be 300 to 600 dots per inch. Images may be "enhanced" to correct for brightness or contrast on underexposed images but should not look artificial. The goal is to have images showing the flower as it is grown in the garden.

Photos must have been taken during the 2022 flowering season and not have been entered in our previous virtual shows.

### **Some Helpful Hints for Taking Photos**

Since each entry is judged in comparison with a standard of perfection for that cultivar there are things to look for in your specimen before you press the button on your phone or camera to capture an image.

- How well is the iris grown? It should be standing straight, not flopped over. The plant and flower should be well-balanced.
- 2. There should be no damage. Look for brown spots, brown leaf tips or torn petals.
- Insects, though artistically delightful, are not included in 'standards of perfection'. Same with stakes, helpful in supporting a flower but not true-to-nature.
- 4. Is the image in strong sunlight with distracting shadows?
- 5. Is there a disruptive background detracting from the flower e.g. a photobombing garden gnome?
- 6. Flower/leaf colours should be true-to-nature.
- 7. If in a pot, the pot should be clean.
- 8. Remove any weeds surrounding the plant.
- Carefully remove any spent blossom <u>except</u> in class 4 - Seedlings.

The two pictures below were entered into the British Iris Society (BIS) summer virtual show by B.J Jackson of the CanWest Iris Society (CWIS). She won 1<sup>st</sup> place in Class 1 – Any bearded iris except Tall Bearded. They are a good example of how an entry should look.

Once your entries are received, they will be numbered so that they are anonymous when they are judged. Only the class number and the name of the cultivar/species will be visible to the judge.

### **Members Choice Judging**
