The Ontario Iris Society Donates to the Nature Conservancy of Canada

In the <u>March/April 2011 edition</u> of *The Iris Standard* there was an article on the dwarf lake iris (I. lacustris). This iris is native to the Great Lakes region of North America, where it grows in cedar swamps and swales in clearings in forested sand-dunes.



Dwarf Lake Iris (I. lacustris)

The dwarf lake iris is small with narrow, arching leaves which are about 6 cm long during the flowering period and can grow to 18 cm by the end of the season. The highly visible flowers have a diameter of 3 to 5 cm. Flowers are typically blue, although there is a variety that produces white flowers.

This species reproduces mainly vegetatively through its rhizomes (underground horizontal stems). This allows the species to establish large colonies often resulting in spreading clumps consisting of genetically identical plants.

In 2008, when the Endangered Species Act took effect, this species was listed as 'threatened'. In 2012 it was re-classified as 'special concern'. It should be noted that species under this classification do not receive species or habitat protection. At present, the main threat to the

dwarf lake iris is the loss of habitat due to human activities such as land development.

China Cove is an area on the Saugeen (Bruce) Peninsula where the dwarf lake iris grows amongst other important species of plants and animals. This 29-hectare property supports many other species at risk including Hill's thistle, and the midland painted turtle. However, this property is under threat and has already been divided into seven building lots ready for development. The Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) is looking for donations to help them preserve this area. With the help of generous donors, NCC has already raised \$2 million of the \$3.2 million required to purchase the China Cove property and care for it over the long-term. Raising the remaining funds is one of NCC's top priorities in Ontario.

Part of the American Iris Society's (AIS) vision statement is "to support the conservation and protection of all irises, including existing wild and cultivated species.". Because we are an affiliate of the AIS the ONIS board felt this project was worthy of our support. To that end, ONIS has donated \$2,000 to NCC in support of the China Grove project.

It's time for the Ontario Iris Society (ONIS) online rhizome sale. Fee-paying members will receive 'the list' of available irises via email. It will also be posted on the ONIS website: Ontario Iris Society - Auctions and Sales (google.com).

Please read carefully

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE?

The sale is open to anyone who lives in Canada.

SALE PERIOD

ONIS MEMBERS: starting Monday, July 21^{st,} fee-paying members can place their orders.

NON-MEMBERS: starting Wednesday, July 23rd, orders will be accepted from non-members.

NOTE: Facebook 'members', who have not paid the ONIS membership fee are considered nonmembers.

Sale closes Saturday, July 26th at midnight (ET).

RHIZOME AVAILABILITY

Order early, some varieties are in limited supply. Orders will be filled on a 'first come, first served' basis. Since we want to fill as many orders as possible, please order only 1 or 2 rhizomes per cultivar. <u>Substitutions welcome</u>. Mark these in your order with 's' or 'sub'.

PHOTOGRAPHS

The 2025 Online Sale List has a link to the American Iris Society's Iris Encyclopedia (aka AIS WIKI) for each cultivar. Click on the link to view pictures and details. If clicking on the link does not work, paste it into your browser.

REBLOOM AND/OR HISTORIC NOTATIONS

Cultivars indicating 'rebloom' are listed as such based on information from the AIS WIKI. There are no guarantees an iris will rebloom in your part of Canada. Cultivars indicating 'historic' were registered with the AIS over 30 years ago (1995 or before).

PRICING

Prices are as indicated in the 2025 Online Sale List. <u>Prices do not include shipping</u>.

Fee-paying ONIS members receive a \$1/rhizome discount. If non-members are ordering more than 10 rhizomes, consider adding a 1-year e-membership for \$10 to receive this discount. Membership details are on the website, Ontario Iris Society (google.com).

SHIPPING CHARGES

Shipping rates continue to rise so we have had to modify our shipping charges.

Ontario, Manitoba & Quebec residents

1 – 9 rhizomes: \$23.00

10 or more rhizomes: \$23.00 plus \$0.50 for each rhizome over 9.

Residents In All Other Provinces

10 or more rhizomes: \$30.00 plus \$0.50 for each rhizome over 9.
